Moving on after secondary school can be a daunting prospect for all students, but more so if a student has SEND. Questions such as: Will my college understand my needs? Will the college have a course that it right for me? Will I be able to continue progressing? Will I get the support I need? These are just a few questions that students may have. If you are a parent of a student who has SEND, then this guide is a very helpful booklet to support you to support your child with their transition.

Gildredge House supports all students with their Post-16 applications and additional support is given to students who have SEND, have English as an additional language (EAL) or have challenges at home.
