Marvellous Makers!

Starts 6 July 2024 Ends 7 September 2024

The Summer Reading Challenge is a national scheme produced by the Reading Agency and delivered by public libraries that encourages children to keep reading during the school summer holidays - and to enjoy anything they like to read! Children aged 4-11 are invited to take part and collect rewards for their reading, giving them a positive experience of reading for pleasure.

It's FREE to take part, and last year 72% of children taking part felt more confident reading.1

Sign your child up at www.eastsussex.gov.uk/src If you don't have a smartphone, computer or tablet, you can sign up using a computer in the library. You can ask a one of our volunteers or a member of staff for help if you need it.

The Challenge will begin in East Sussex libraries on Saturday 6th July and end on Saturday 7th September.

The Challenge is to read any six books borrowed from the library or downloaded from our ebook library. For children under 4 we have the Pre-school Challenge, where you can collect stickers for each book shared and a special medal sticker at the end.

Children signing up for the Challenge get a character sticker and a Reader Record. Children will be able to collect a prize for each of the six books they have read. When they finish the Challenge they will get a certificate which they can receive in school or at the library. The Challenge is for all children, whatever their reading ability. Children who are not reading independently can share their books with a family member or friend, or they might prefer to listen to audio books.

To take part in Marvellous Makers! children need to have their own library card and PIN. It is easy and free to become a member of the library. Take something with your name, address and signature to the library and you can join the whole family. You can reset your child's PIN online if you can't remember it, or ask in the library for a new one. You will need the PIN to sign up to the Challenge.

Why is Reading for Pleasure important?

Children who read for pleasure have a wider vocabulary and general knowledge, an enriched imagination and more developed narrative writing. Reading for Pleasure is more important than either wealth or social class as an indicator of success at school. It can increase empathy, improve relationships with others and improve wellbeing throughout life (The Reading Agency).

We loved reading this book because it kept us guessing what may happen next and we could not guess any of the twists!


The Girl of Ink and Stars by Kiran Millwood Hargrave Recommended by Mae in Year 8 for 11+.

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Author Spotlight: Marjeet Mann

Manjeet Mann is an actress, playwright, screenwriter, and director. She is the founder of Run the World - an organisation that works with women and girls from marginalised backgrounds and helps to empower them through sport and storytelling. She is the author of two YA novels - Run, Rebel was shortlisted for the Carnegie Medal 2021 and won the CILIP Carnegie Shadowers Choice Award, The UKLA Award, Diverse Book Award and Sheffield Children's Book Award. The Crossing won The Costa Children's Book Award and was shortlisted for the Carnegie Medal.



WHAT WAS YOUR FAVOURITE CHILDHOOD BOOK AND WHY?



Roald Dahl's Boy was one of my favourites. I read it multiple times. I think I was inspired by how seemingly ordinary events were made extraordinary. It's genius. He was also my favourite author so getting a little window into his life felt very special.





I'm not sure I have a favourite because each book takes so long and is the product of so much hard work and you pour so much of yourself into every piece of work you create. But I suppose The Crossing is the product many years of research (about 6 years!) and lots of interviews with some very brave young people willing to share their story with me, so it will always have a special place in my heart.
