#### CHILDREN IN NEED


The primary children have been doing their part to support Children in Need by taking part in a highenergy, fun workout class.

#### **Non-Fiction November!**



Hey, Water! Antoinette Portis




A young girl explores her environment and finds that water is everywhere. At the end of the book, there is additional factual information. A wonderful way to encourage conversations about the importance of water!



Building on the success of last year's computer science students in Key Stages 3,4 and 5 this week we have been working through the Bebras computational thinking challenge during our Computer Science lessons.

The Bebras challenge is an international challenge that introduces computational thinking to students and builds on the work done in lessons. Over 3 million students across the world take part.

Students are presented with various computational thinking challenges to complete over 40 minutes.

Students are grouped into age groups :

- Castors (8-10)
- Juniors (10-12)
- Inters (12-14)
- Seniors (14-16)
- Elite (16-18)
- SVI (10-18)

And students who's results are in the top 10% of their age group get invited to the next stage of the competition organised by Oxford University (<u>https://www.bebras.uk/index.php?action=content&id=42</u>).

The competition closes on Friday and we will then get the results, all students who took part will receive a certificate.


